It pointed out that this "disunity" does not necessarily mean a weakening of the communist effort but may result in strengthening it as more Parties permit the communists to embrace more issues and thereby enroll more people into their programs to demoralize and destroy this country.

Six parties have been selected for discussion. Each of these Parties has sufficient members and supporters to produce and circulate a weekly newspaper. These Parties are:

- 1. The Communist Party, U.S.A.
- 2. The Socialist Workers Party
- 3. The Progressive Labor Party
- 4. The Revolutionary Communist Party
- 5. The Communist Party (Marxist-Leninist)
- The "Guardian" Communist Party— (presently in embryo)

Communist Newspapers

In the September newsletter, the National Caucus of Labor Committees, with its subsidiary, the U.S. Labor Party, (NCLC-USLP) was also listed. This Party constitutes a special case and current developments cast doubt on its claim to be a Communist Party. Recent issues of its newspaper, New Solidarity, have criticized not only Communist China and the Soviet Union, but Marxism-Leninism itself and have raised again the specter of an International Jewish financial coterie dominating mankind. The U.S. Labor Party is also cooperating with other organizations of the "Hate Rockefeller" fraternity which have always presented themselves as anticommunist. The NCLC-USLP is appearing more and more as a classical Fascist Party. Since there is great structural similarity between Communist and Fascist Parties and since their programs overlap, transference from one to the other is relatively easy.

Each Communist Party has a unified position or "line" on major questions, and all members of that Party must adhere to that position. On some questions all Parties have the same "line" while they differ on other issues. All are agreed on the following:

1. The Vanguard:

Each Party believes that history is choosing a "vanguard" to lead the struggle of the oppressed for
